Kanazawa Castle Park

Kanazawa Castle Park is an open green space, preserving the historical and cultural heritage of Ishikawa for generations to come. Many castle structures, such as the Hishi-yagura, Gojukken-nagaya and Hashizume-mon, have been restored to their former glory. This restoration project was the biggest of its kind ever attempted in Japan since the Meiji period (1868 ~ 1912).



Kenrokuen Garden With its great natural beauty augmented by the four distinct seasons of Ishikawa, Kenrokuen Garden is regarded as one of the three most beautiful gardens in Japan and designated as a Special Historic Site by the Japanese governmen



Higashi-chayagai District

Higashi-chayagai district is where, even now, the appearance of the old streets still exists and has kept its old face. When evening approaches, the sounds of the shamisen and Japanese taiko overflow from the tea houses



Kanazawa Noh Museum Kanazawa Noh Museum offers its visitors various things such as visuals explaining Noh art in simple terms, about Noh stage through its model, display of precious historical artifacts.



Ishikawa Prefectural Museum of Traditional Arts and Crafts

This Museum displays all the famous traditional arts and crafts of Ishikawa and offers its visitors an introduction to the process of making these craftworks. The museum also has a museum shop and café where visitors can actually touch the art and craft works.



Omicho Market Omicho Market in Musashigatsuji has served as the kitchen for the people of Kanazawa for approximately 270 years. There are 170 stores inserted into the small alleys where fish from the Sea of Japan, local meats, vegetables, fruits and seasonal foods are at the center of the trade that occurs here.



Korinbo is one of the most prominent shopping and entertainment districts in the Hokuriku area. Its bustling streets are lined with department stores, boutiques, restaurants, and drinking



The Motenashi Dome of





Festivals in Ishikawa

There are many types of traditional festivals: festivals in spring to pray for abundant crops, festivals in summer requesting for safety at sea and the blessings of the sea, festivals in autumn to express ratitude for a good harvest, and festivals in winter to drive away evil sprits and bring luck and safety for the New Year. The seasonal festivals in Ishikawa provide the energy and prayers necessary for everyone to live and work harmoniously.

The Noto "Kiriko" Festival

Many festivals take place on the Noto Peninsula during the summer. The center of attraction for many of these festivals is the "Kiriko" sacred lanterns that are approximately 10m in height. These great lanterns are carried through the streets by young people and dance wildly through the night sky. The Noto Town "Abare Festival" and the Nanao City "Issaki loto Festival" are especially heroic and magnificent in nature.
